**IS YOUR HOME KOSHER?**

For the convenience of members who wish to become kosher, our Rabbi has arranged to have dishes and pots and pans and cutlery "Kashered" in the Shul. There has been an extremely heartening increase in the number of families who have called our Rabbi to avail themselves of this service. The facilities of the Shul and the Rabbi are available to anyone.

What is involved in your home is the scraping and scouring of the stove until all particles of food are removed from both the oven and the range. The oven and range are left to burn at a high temperature for fifteen minutes. All the counters must be "steam cleaned". This is done by making them wet and passing a hot home iron over the surface. Pots, pans, cutlery, and all metal vessels that have been dented or badly scratched that are not able to be properly cleaned should be disgarded as should most pieces of China.

Handles, where possible, must be removed. All these items as well as any metal parts from appliances such as beaters etc. after a thorough cleaning should be brought to the Shul and "Kashered" by dipping them into a large pot of boiling water to extract any lingering non-kosher particles.

After this is done all these items must be taken to the Mikvah and immersed.

All those who have become kosher have sensed a new pride and a Jewish rebirth in the knowledge that they are now observing a tradition which is as ancient as it is Holy. Parents also feel that they thereby do not deprive their children of an opportunity to be kosher, something which may become very dear to them in later life.
